A LETTER FROM THE PASTOR

Wars and Rumors of Wars

And you will hear of wars and rumors of wars. See that you are not alarmed, for this must take place, but the end is not yet. Nation will rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom, and there will be famines and earthquakes in various places. All these are but the beginning of the birth pains. — Matthew 24:6-8

Jesus spoke these words in answer to two questions in Matthew's Gospel. 1) When will the temple be destroyed, and 2) what will be the sign of your coming and of the end of the age? In Mark and Luke, the question of the disciples is focused on the destruction of the temple, but Jesus gives the same answer that encompasses both the end of the temple and the end of the age at the Lord's return.

Jesus seems to respond to both questions with the same answer. Much time is spent trying to determine which words Jesus says in connection with the destruction of the temple and which words were said concerning the end of the world. But it is not easy put each statement neatly into a box.

This is because each question has the same answer or at least answers that largely overlap. The destruction of the temple was the end of *their* world as they knew it, and Jesus' coming again is the end of the entire world. Both ends are accompanied by the calamities Jesus speaks about. These things will happen until Jesus comes again. There will be wars and rumors of wars, famines, and earthquakes until the day the Lord Jesus descends from heaven with a shout.

As we look at the tragedy in Ukraine, we know we are not to be alarmed. The end is not yet, though it is closer now than when we first believed. The world has been in birth pains since Christ rose from the dead—for then the new Creation had already come, the release from bondage for which the whole creation longs and waits. We live in the birth pains of this new Creation being brought to fulfillment at our Lord's return.

The Christian is not alarmed at the birth pains but expects them. The Christian does not occupy himself with determining the hour of our Lord's return, which no one knows except the Father in heaven. Rather, the Christian lives watching and waiting, always prepared for His return and the completion of our salvation.

Though our eyes see tragedy and evil, we know by faith that Jesus is reigning. He is seated at the right hand of the Father and has all authority in heaven and on earth even now. He is working all things out for good for those who love the Lord—even our brothers and sisters in Ukraine. Even as their homeland is under attack, even in the worst conflicts this world can bring, Christians have peace. How? They are part of the kingdom which is not of this world. The kingdom which cannot be shaken. As Christ comes in Word and Sacrament into this crumbling world, the world to come is ours now. For our brothers and sisters in Ukraine, they are experiencing firsthand how true our Lord's words are—*Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. Not as the world gives do I give to you. Let not your hearts be troubled, neither let them be afraid.* (John 14:27).

We pray for our brothers and sisters in Ukraine and for us all—deliver us from evil. This prayer is fully answered only in the world to come, yet it is ours today in the kingdom that comes to us in Christ our Lord.


LADIES AID SALE

Blessed Shall You Be

"Blessed shall you be in the city, and blessed shall you be in the field. Blessed shall be the fruit of your womb and the fruit of your ground and the fruit of your cattle, the increase of your herds and the young of your flock. Blessed shall be your basket and your kneading bowl. Blessed shall you be when you come in, and blessed shall you be when you go out." (Deuteronomy 28:3-6)

This is God's promise to the Israelites as they stood beyond the Jordan outside of the Promised Land. He promises blessing to His people. He will make them prosper, whether they are in the city or the field. He will make their fruit of their work to prosper, whether from the ground, their wombs, their flocks, or their herds. He will make them to prosper in all things, whether upon their coming in or their going out.

But there's a catch. He would do this for Israel only "if you obey the voice of the LORD your God." (Deut. 28:2b) If they did that, He would cause that "all these blessings shall come upon you and overtake you." (Deut. 28:2a). If they didn't obey the voice of the Lord, if they didn't keep the commandments of the Lord and "walk in his ways" (Deut. 28:9), they would be met with curse and woe. The blessings would be replaced with curses. Everything that the Lord promised to prosper and bless would be cursed and fail.

Thanks be to God that our Lord Jesus Christ has come into our flesh and fulfilled the law for us – in our place and for our benefit. Our Lord Jesus Christ died for us – in our place and for our benefit. Our Lord Jesus Christ is risen from the dead for us – in our place and for our benefit. By this we have justification before God. We are forgiven, clean, holy, and righteous. The blessing of God is promised to us in Christ Jesus. It depends upon his work, not ours.

All this is ours in Holy Baptism. For in Holy Baptism, God claims us as His own, makes us His children, His heirs, and His holy people. And so it is that the work of our hands and its fruit is holy because we are holy in Christ. It is pressed into His service, and it thereby becomes a blessing to us and to our neighbor.

For this great gift, our reception of the blessings of God because of Christ Jesus our Lord, it is our duty to thank and praise, serve, and obey Him. This is not in order to receive the blessings but because in Christ we already have. With this in mind, we sit down on the first day of the week and set aside as He has prospered us to give to His church for His work of blessing in our midst (1 Cor. 16:2).

Dear Pastor Bayer and people of God at Saint Peter Lutheran Church,

On January 28, 2022, our heavenly Father called my dad, Glenn Erber home to heaven.

Together with our children, Mom and Dad have been our closest mission partners.

Mom and Dad were with Joyce and me in May 1986 at the seminary in Fort Wayne for "Call Service" and the announcement of my first (and only) call in the ministry to: The Board for Mission Services, Nigeria, West Africa. They helped us pack our missionary barrels and bags for our first departure to Africa in January 1987.

They came to visit us in Nigeria in 1990, soon after our first child was born. They spent time with Chief Besong Obun, Eugene Ebu-Ekpang, Nagu's mother and many others. They came to live in Nigeria and taught at Hillcrest school from 1994 to 1996. These were the years when we were treading where there was no other Christian presence. We were trekking and planting churches in villages 30 miles from the end road. Mom and Dad simultaneously had great teaching experiences yet also suffered falls with broken bones and severe sicknesses. While they taught at Hillcrest School, our oldest, Luke, stayed with them and went to First Grade at Hillcrest school (9 hours away from home).

Back in the USA, Mom and Dad were our tremendous home base support team. We relied on them greatly during the years I worked through the Fort Wayne seminary PhD in Missiology degree to study traditional African training methods for training local indigenous pastors and church leaders. Mom and Dad were here for me in 2003, when I fell and had to be evacuated out of our little village in a remote corner of Nigeria and brought back to the USA for surgery and six months of recovery. The story goes on and on. And for years, Mom and Dad helped us with printing, enveloping and mailing these letters. (I'm not sure how we are going to do these letters now! As with everything else, God will help us!)

Dad was a great mission partner!

We rejoice, Dad is in heaven, in the everlasting arms of Jesus! His body awaits the resurrection in Hillcrest cemetery in Jackson, Michigan. The day of resurrection will be amazing for all who believe!

In the meantime, we've got to keep reaching out to those who are still lost!

Joyce and I have been with Mom during these last couple of weeks helping her to work through a multitude of details. Joyce and I have tickets return to Ghana on Thursday, February 24.

Steve) Stolarczyk of Unionville, Michigan. Those blessings only grew through the years with the addition of grandchildren: Matthew Shaw, Bethanee (Leif) Palland, Mirian Sunderman, Morgan (Seth) Yellowfox, Charity Sunderman, Dr. Luke Erber, Jonathan Erber, Naomi (Michael) Ersland, Faith Boettcher, Grace Boettcher, Paul Boettcher, Michael Stolarczyk, Owen Stolarczyk, Caleb Block, Lex Stolarczyk; and great-grandchildren: Autumn, Sebastian, Benjamin, and Frankie Shaw; Austin, Zoey, and Barrett Miller; Elizabeth, Lucy, and Jack Yellowfox; Josephine and Jeffrey Burton; and Evelyn Stolarczyk.

In spite of physical distance, the whole family remained close through their shared love and Glenn's rich sense of humor. They were blessed in their community with wonderful neighbors who, through the years, became good friends, sharing his joy and satisfaction in gardening, reading, woodworking, the Detroit Tigers, the Detroit Lions, and Michigan State sports.


Glenn started on the path to full time church work from an early age. After reaffirming his faith in the Rite of Confirmation, he was enrolled at Concordia High School and Concordia Teachers College in Seward, Nebraska. His teaching ministry first took him to a one room Lutheran school in Hoxie, Kansas. Upon graduation, God also blessed him with the gift of a wife, Lois (Kellner), on August 1, 1954. Together, they began teaching at Zion Lutheran School, Tobias, Nebraska. There Glenn served as a teacher, principal, organist, choir director, youth group leader, Sunday School director, janitor, and congregational secretary. Glenn next served Christ Lutheran School in Columbus, Nebraska. While there, he completed a master's degree in Education Administration at the University of Nebraska. Then, in 1966, he accepted the call to serve as principal at Trinity Lutheran School, Jackson, Michigan. While at Trinity, he took part in three major building programs, established a preschool program and a childcare facility, and transitioned the school into the computer age. He led the school faithfully, doing whatever was needed, including at times, driving a school bus.

He also served the Michigan District of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod as a member of the Board of Directors, as the Chairman of the South and East Teachers Conference, as the Program Chairman and Conference Chairman of the District Principals' Conference, and as a member of the District Accreditation Committee.

Glenn continued to serve at Trinity after his retirement, leading a Bible study and visiting shutins. He also served beyond Trinity, served as principal for two years at St. Matthew Lutheran School, Holt, and served as the director of teacher placement at Concordia University, Ann Arbor. He and Lois also taught missionary children in Nigeria for two years and served in other mission trips in Poland, Venezuela, the Virgin Islands and in various parts of the United States. God blessed Glenn's life with many dear friends. Even as he was blessed, he was a blessing to many others along the way.

Finally, on January 28, 2022, God blessed Glenn with a holy death and took him home to rest in the arms of Jesus to await the resurrection of the dead. "Jesus said . . . "I am the resurrection and the life. Whoever believes in me, though he die, yet shall he live!" (John 11:25-26).

The funeral service was held on Thursday, February 3, at Trinity Lutheran Church, 122 West Wesley Street, Jackson. The Rev. Galen Grulke officiated. Glenn was laid to rest with at Hillcrest Memorial Park. Memorial donations were given to Trinity Lutheran School and/or Lutheran Hour Ministries.




