I was glad when they said to me, "Let us go to the house of the LORD!"
- Psalm 122:1

It is now July. Chances are, you have not remained in your home exclusively since the news of the COVID-19 pandemic hit in mid-March. Chances are that you have ventured out, at least on occasion, for necessities, visits to family, or other activities. Or, you may now be living your life nearly in a normal fashion—trips to work, out to dinner with the family, baseball games, Walmart trips, etc. (albeit with the use of a mask as ordered by our governor).

If, since mid-March, not a single one of your trips out has been a trip to church, it is now time to ask the question—are you truly avoiding church due to concern over the virus or have the circumstances become a convenient excuse? If you have left your house at all in the last four months, I would hope that church would have been at least one of those priority trips.

On the Sixth Sunday after Pentecost, the Gospel lesson was the parable of the sower from Matthew 13. In that parable, the life-giving Word of God is likened to seed that is sown by a sower. The word of the Kingdom goes out, inviting all into the grace of God through His Son Jesus Christ. Yet the parable of the sower reminds us not only of the life and salvation worked by the Word, but also the tragedy of the seed not bearing fruit. The warning of this parable is strong—*most* of the seed comes to naught. It either falls on deaf ears, or Christians turn away from the faith because of persecution on account of that Word, or they are choked out and killed by cares for this life and the deceitfulness of riches.

We have seen an unprecedented emptying of our churches. The cares of this age are posing a serious, fatal risk to Christians right now. As we grasp at smoke and vapor, looking to policy and vaccines to save us, is our fascination with things temporal and fleeting choking us out of the life that does not end?

The seed that gave us life in Jesus Christ crucified for our sins and risen for our justification, namely the Word of God, is also the water that nurtures and sustains our new life in Christ. For many Christians right now, they have experienced serious drought conditions. Your parched faith will not survive by your own strength—it will only survive by the ongoing work of the Spirit through the Word and Sacraments.

And you'd better believe the Word of God has the power to keep us in the faith. It will not return void but will accomplish the purpose for which it was sent. So bring yourself to the living waters of the Spirit—the rushing channels of Word and Sacrament. God will lift you up from the cares of this age and set your minds on things above—where Christ, as our head, is already seated. With our eyes continually fixed on Jesus, the extremes and disasters of this world are put in proper perspective and the cares of this age are denied the ability to choke and kill us and to drag us down with the world that is passing away. Instead, we are more than conquerors through Him who loved us and gave Himself for us.

We continue to do many basic things to ensure the safety of all gathered at church. The offering plate is not passed. Masks are available at the back, or you may bring your own. We are spacing every other row and sitting in households. When attendance increases to the point where this becomes difficult, we have a plan in place to temporarily add an additional service. See you in the house of the Lord.



St. Peter Family

To further support and elaborate on Pastor Bayer's message, I thought I would use this opportunity to share the procedures the elders have implemented during worship services, to help everyone feel more comfortable in the sanctuary.

Current actions, as of Sunday, July 19th:

Seating is limited to every other pew to allow for recommended social distancing.

Offerings are not collected during the service. A plate is placed in the back of the church for contributions and attendance cards.

Antibacterial disinfectant is available in the back of the church. There is also a bottle on the altar that Pastor uses before serving communion. A third bottle is in the sacristy, and is used by the elder prior to setting the communion table, and again prior to assisting Pastor with serving.

The center section of the communion railing is not used, allowing each family to be separated from another. After each table setting, an usher disinfects the step railings and the communion railing with antibacterial wipes.

For those who desire to wear a mask, please do so. You can bring your own, or there are some available in the back of the church.

Following the service and announcements, an usher will release the congregation one family at a time, beginning with the front pew. Pastor will greet congregants outside, weather permitting.

Potential future actions:

While social distancing recommendations are still in place, a second Divine Service will be added when church attendance results in the sanctuary being at one-third capacity (80 attendees) for two consecutive weeks. As a guide, recent attendance has typically been in the 60s.


Prayer Chain

Confirmation

What a joy Sunday, July 5th was. On this day, Lydia Bloom, Gabe Schneider, Savana Watson, and Skylar Watson were confirmed in the faith and received their First Communion. We give thanks to God for the gift of faith that He bestowed on them in Baptism and for their continued instruction in the Word of God that led them to this special day.

Now we can begin thinking about the next round of catechumens. I want each of you to help me reach out to young people you know to invite them to participate in Confirmation instruction. Think broadly; these do not need to be only young people from our congregation. They just need to be young people whose parents would be supportive of them doing this. In fact, inviting people outside of the congregation to participate has the potential of bringing entire families into our communion, as parents will learn alongside their children throughout this process.

My beginning target age for catechesis leading to Confirmation and First Communion is children going into 5th grade. And there is no top age! Anyone who would like to be confirmed and begin receiving their Savior's body and blood are welcome to this time of instruction. And why stop ourselves there?—if you are already confirmed, but would like a refresher, come to as many or as few of the classes as you would like. They are open to all and are another weekly opportunity for instruction in the Word of God.

An informational meeting will be held in the school gym / fellowship hall Sunday, August 16th, at 3:30 pm. At that time, students will be registered, we will discuss the process, and schedules will be distributed. This will be a year-long process, with the incoming students being confirmed next summer. The year will include a Confirmation Retreat in February that is a great opportunity for youth to go on a trip together and strengthen not only their understanding of the faith but their ties to their peers in the body of Christ.

Think of young (or old) people you know and invite them to the informational meeting on August 16th.


