History of St. Peter part of 150 anniversary celebration



Did you ever wonder why our St. Peter congregation has its roots in Clinton County's Riley, Bengal and Dallas Townships? Why did our forefathers and mothers choose a location that was not exactly on the beaten path or close to settlements like DeWitt and Westphalia?

Part of the answer is simple. It actually was close to "a beaten path," just a stone's throw from Dexter Trail. Native American guides had used the trail for years, helping immigrants on their journey northwest from Detroit to their future homes in settlements like Westphalia, Muir, Ionia and far-away Grand Rapids. In 1833, Judge Samuel Dexter and his family were among those traveling on what became known as Dexter Trail. His son, Riley Dexter, died in 1834 after contracting scarlet fever, and was buried beside the trail about a mile north of St. Peter's present day location. He was the first Caucasian child buried in Clinton County.

Similar tidbits of St. Peter's history are part of a slide presentation that will be a focal point of our 150th celebration. Beginning in February, congregation members and guests can have a "sneak preview" of St. Peter's early years when a sampling of slides will be shown at each worship service. The history show will be viewed in its entirety during gatherings following special services in March through October. Those special service dates include:

- March 17: Michigan District President Rev. David Meier. Worship begins at 10 a.m., followed by lunch at St. Peter Fellowship Center. Lunch includes tastings from the annual St. Peter Chili Cook-off, along with additional types of soup, salad and desserts.
- April 28: "Heritage Sunday" with guest Pastor David Speerbrecker; pot-luck dinner follows in the Fellowship Hall.
- June 23: Outdoor worship with Pastor Mark Werner, and St. Peter's Annual Hog Roast; special activities for youth and adults.
- October 13: Guest Pastor Jeffrey Heimsoth; catered dinner in the Fellowship Center, following worship.

Updates on these special services will be included in the Sunday bulletin and upcoming newsletters. Also, remember to look for "Past Memories of St. Peter's 150 Years" each week in the Sunday bulletin as we celebrate 150 years of being "Built on the Rock" Yesterday, Today and Tomorrow."


