A LETTER FROM THE PASTOR

Administration of the Sacrament of the Altar

A simple description of the procedure for the distribution of the Lord's body and blood is provided in the printed order of service each week, but a little more explanation may be warranted.

At the time of distribution, those who are unable to come to the altar are served first at their seats. If you receive communion at your seat, please sit toward the front of the church so the elements need not be carried a far distance. If you are able, stand to receive the Lord's body and blood. If we do not see you, and you need to be served at your seat, raise your hand. We have returned to our normal practice which was interrupted by the pandemic in that the blood of Christ is brought in the chalice to those in their seats for reasons of reverence and practicality.

At the altar, following the distribution of the Lord's body, the blood of Christ is distributed from the chalice. For those desiring to use an individual cup, these are given after the chalice.

Last, a couple notes on receiving the Supper that contribute to reverence and good order so our focus can be on the gift we are receiving. The body of Christ can be received either directly into your mouth or into your hand to be eaten. To receive in your mouth, open your mouth when the pastor gets to you, and he will place the host on your tongue. To receive in your hand, hold your hands palms upward, one hand on top of the other. To receive the blood of Christ from the chalice, hold your hands out again to indicate you would like to receive from the chalice. When drinking from the chalice, the pastor will continue holding the chalice at the knob, but you may hold the base of the chalice to tip it for yourself as you drink.

I hope this brief description promotes a salutary use of the Sacrament of the Altar, where the sacred body and blood of Christ are handled reverently and faith, which believes the promises offered and set forth through the Sacrament, is increased.

The teachers are celebrating alongside their students in the learning that they have seen throughout the year. Learning that came from careful planning by the teachers and hard work put in by the students.



A LETTER FROM OUR CANTOR

Why We Do What We Do

Last time I pointed out that one objective in Lutheran worship is to preserve what has been some of the Church's legacy across centuries and throughout the world. With that as background, let me touch briefly on another detail.

Perhaps you've noticed "+" at various places in the liturgy. In all probability, during your Baptism, the Pastor said, "Receive the sign of the holy cross both upon your forehead and upon your heart to mark you as one redeemed by Christ the crucified." As he said this, he made the cross on your forehead and heart. Luther continuously said our Baptism is an ongoing present reality, not just some event in the past. So it fits that, as we worship in the name of our Triune God, we do so, as our hymnal suggests, remembering it is into His name that we are Baptized. So also as we conclude the Creed in which we confess His Name.

Pastor makes the sign of the cross at the end of the Confession and Absolution, when dismissing us from the Sacrament, and during the Benediction. For the worshiper to do the same then is a way of acknowledging the words of blessing apply to the individual, not just everyone else.

Does making the sign of the cross make you a better Christian? Absolutely not. Does NOT making the sign make you a better Christian? Again, no. Faith in the Redeemer into whose name you were Baptized is the issue. But knowing the theology of making the sign of the cross can help us understand those who choose to do it. And you may consider trying it as a way to celebrate your Baptism.

I hope to share more of why we do what we do. Perhaps if you have a particular question or concern, you might pass that along to me through the church office.


LADIES AID SALE

Endowment Fund Newsletter Article June 2022

One of the roles of the Endowment Board is to educate the congregation about the Endowment Fund, its benefits and how to contribute. The Endowment Fund is not meant to compete with operational dollars but to enhance ministry offerings beyond what the annual budget offers.

The Endowment Fund is a way to receive special gifts outside of the operational budget of the church. It provides an opportunity and a structure for members to provide a future legacy for the church and their families through planned giving such as a will, estate planning, life insurance, etc. While the original gift will grow through prudent investments, the church can use the earnings each year to enhance church and school ministries, outreach, and facility improvement projects.

Gifts to the Endowment Fund can happen in many ways. It can be a one time gift such as a memorial, a direct gift such as cash or stock or through a legacy donation from a will or estate plan. At St Peter Lutheran Church legacy donations are accepted and welcomed.

What Do You Have That You Have Not Received?

Some of the disciples of John the Baptist were questioning him about the baptism and preaching of Jesus. John the Baptist replies to their questions in this way: "A person cannot receive even one thing unless it is given him from heaven" (John 3:27).

Now, John the Baptist says this to show that Jesus, His teaching, and His baptism are from heaven. But this statement is true of everything – everything that we have and are in body and soul. In fact, this is what we are taught in the meaning of the Apostles' Creed in *Luther's Small Catechism*.

In the explanation of the Creed's First Article, we learn that God has made us and everything in the universe. Luther says:

"He has given me my body and soul, eyes, ears, and all my members, my reason and all my senses, and still takes care of them. He also gives me clothing and shoes, food and drink, house and home, wife and children, land, animals, and all I have. He richly and daily provides me with all that I need to support this body and life. He defends me against all danger and guards and protects me from all evil. All this He does only out of fatherly, divine goodness and mercy, without any merit or worthiness in me. For all this it is my duty to thank and praise, serve and obey Him."

In the Second Article of the Creed, we learn that God sent His Son, Jesus, to humble Himself, taking the form of a servant. Luther writes:

"(Jesus) has redeemed me, a lost and condemned person, purchased and won me from all sins, from death, and from the power of the devil; not with gold or silver, but with His holy, precious blood and with His innocent suffering and death, that I may be His own and live under Him in His kingdom and serve Him in everlasting righteousness, innocence, and blessedness, just as He is risen from the dead, lives and reigns to all eternity."

In the Third Article of the Creed, we learn that the fruits of what Jesus Christ, the Son of God, did are given to us through the work of the Holy Spirit in the Church. Luther explains:

"That I cannot by my own reason or strength believe in Jesus Christ, my Lord, or come to Him; but the Holy Spirit has called me by the Gospel, enlightened me with His gifts, sanctified and kept me in the true faith. In the same way He calls, gathers, enlightens, and sanctifies the whole Christian church on earth, and keeps it with Jesus Christ in the one true faith. In this Christian church He daily and richly forgives all my sins and the sins of all believers. On the Last Day He will raise me and all the dead, and give eternal life to me and all believers in Christ."

Indeed, a person cannot receive even one thing unless it is given him from heaven. But how easy is this for us to forget about this?

How easy is it for us to think that what we have in this life is because we have earned it? How easy is it for us to forget that even all our skills, the abilities of our hands and minds – the very ethic to work diligently and to seek to get better at these skills – is given to us from heaven, just as John the Baptist said? How easy is it for us to forget that it is Christ alone – and the work of the Holy Spirit – that reveals His salvation to us, delivers it to us, and not our doing?

Sure, we have responsibility for coming to church, for delving into God's Holy Word, and for praying without ceasing. But even these responsibilities are given to us from heaven, not to earn anything but in response to what He has accomplished for us.

A person cannot receive one thing unless it is given to him from heaven. Everything we have, and everything we are – in both body and soul – are gifts from God in heaven. Let us then respond in thanksgiving and give back to Him as He asks us to – with a first-fruits, generous proportion offering of what He has given to us.




HOG ROAST NEWS

David and Joyce Erber LCMS International Mission in Ghana, West Africa April 30, 2022

Dear Partners in Mission,

In late 2021, LCMS International Mission met with Concordia Seminary in Saint Louis, Missouri and formed a plan to offer an Online Master of Arts in Theology degree for Lutheran pastors in Africa.

LCMS asked me to serve as the 'on the ground in Africa' coordinator for this effort. I am grateful for support from our missionary team, especially for Rev. Dr. Walter Steele (Kenya) and Mrs. Megan Mantey (Uganda) who serve as program facilitators with me.

Sixteen pastors from Ghana (4), Kenya (4), South Sudan (1) and Uganda (7) have been working on the application process including an Online English exam.

The application process, including the English examination, has been really challenging for these men. Some of them have little or no experience with the computer or internet.

I have been meeting these men in face-to-face using Zoom and working with them through email. Getting these men up and going on computers and the internet is essential for their success in the Online studies.

Instructors in Saint Louis will teach the classes over the internet. Our Zoom sessions have been a good first step of preparation for these classes. Our next steps are coming quickly!

Applications are all due tomorrow, May 1!

We are praying for those men who are still working to send their application documents!



Some of the pastors applying for these studies already teach at their local seminaries or are senior pastors who are responsible for care and supervision of large numbers of other pastors and congregations. Some are congregational pastors.

It is a privilege for me to connect with these special pastors in Kenya, South Sudan, Uganda and here in Ghana! My Zoom sessions with these men have been really great.

It is also a privilege for me to work with Concordia Seminary in Saint Louis and with our LCMS missionary team here in Africa.

May God bless these efforts: the application and admission process And the special upcoming studies in theology across Africa!
