The Mass and its Ceremonies

"Our churches are falsely accused of abolishing the Mass. The Mass is held among us and celebrated with the highest reverence. Nearly all the usual ceremonies are also preserved..." (AC XXIV.1-2).

Well now, that sounds "Catholic" (insert degrading tone of voice). I've heard rumblings that "we're becoming too Catholic" at St. Peter. I'm sure you've heard them too. I'm assuming this critique is aimed at our form of worship and not our doctrine. Going back to that quote, would it surprise you to learn that it comes from the Augsburg Confession, the very confession that is etched in the stone above our front door at St. Peter Lutheran Church? On that stone you will see the initials "U. A. C." – meaning Unaltered Augsburg Confession.

Imagine in your mind what the Mass was like when our forefathers made this confession back in 1530. This was the Mass in use in the Middle Ages in Europe. In other words, the Mass we confess that we retain would probably cause modern Roman Catholics themselves to say, "this is too Catholic!"

The Augsburg Confession, along with correcting errors and abuses in the Roman Church, had one other chief goal—to confess that the "Lutherans" were catholic! In other words, they wanted to make it abundantly clear that their teachings and practice were not something new, but a continuation of the one, true faith of the Church of all times and all places (the true meaning of 'catholic').

The Church didn't begin with Martin Luther. He was a servant God used mightily to correct great and egregious abuses in the Church and restore the clarity and prominence of the Gospel. But the reformation was no revolution. The abuses were corrected according to the Word of God, but everything good and salutary was retained—including the Mass with nearly all its usual ceremonies. This would have included vestments, chanting, candles, crucifixes, bells, altars, pulpits, statues, and yes, even incense. For also in the Augsburg Confession, we confess, "Our churches teach that ceremonies ought to be observed that may be observed without sin" (AC XV.1). Isn't that interesting wording? Not only do we confess that the ceremonies of the Church (the Roman church in 1530) *may* be observed, but that they *ought* to be observed. The reason is that they "are profitable for tranquility and good order in the Church" (AC XV.1) and that ceremonies teach what we need to know about Christ (AC XXIV.3). The ceremonies direct our attention to the gifts our Lord gives in the Mass.

Remember, these are our *Lutheran* Confessions, the very Confessions that our pastors vow themselves to in our churches. On June 30, 2019, I was asked the following question in our church at my ordination: "Do you confess the Unaltered Augsburg Confession to be a true exposition of Holy Scripture and a correct exhibition of the doctrine of the Evangelical Lutheran Church? And do you confess that the Apology of the Augsburg Confession, the Small and Large Catechisms of Martin Luther, the Smalcald Articles, the Treatise on the Power and Primacy of the Pope, and the Formula of Concord—as these are contained in the Book of Concord—are also in agreement with this one scriptural faith?" And my answer then and now is, "Yes, I make these Confessions my own because they are in accord with the Word of God."

So, while we certainly don't need to use incense in worship or include other ceremonies of the Church—for we confess that these things are not necessary for salvation (AC XV.2)—it is thoroughly Lutheran to do so. And yes, it certainly is catholic, which is also thoroughly Lutheran.

Since Mrs. Brown will also be serving as principal and teacher of grades Five through Seven, it is good that her class size might be a little smaller. The numbers in the upper grades will increase as our lower grade students move up year after year.

It has been a great year with God's rich blessings, and we know that He will continue to bless our school, teachers, and staff if we continue to place our trust in Him and His guidance and mercy.




Prayer Chain



Stewardship Newsletter Article – May 2021

St. Paul teaches us: "Let the one who is taught the word share all good things with the one who teaches" (Gal. 6:6). And again, he says: "Do you not know that those who are employed in the temple service get their food from the temple, and those who serve at the altar share in the sacrificial offerings? In the same way, the Lord commanded that those who proclaim the gospel should get their living by the gospel" (1 Cor. 9:13–14). In other words, ministers of the Gospel are supported by the offerings of those who are served by them.

And this is how the church lives even now. It is standard practice. But this deserves closer examination. For it instructs us not just *that* we are to give but also *what* we are to give. And it does so with four little words: "In the same way ..."

St. Paul is building his case for supporting the preachers of the Gospel with the sacrificial giving of individual members on the example of the Old Testament people who supported the Levites with their offerings and sacrifices. We're to support the Gospel ministry "in the same way." But how did the Old Testament people support the Levites?


Moses records this: "You shall tithe all the yield of your seed that comes from the field year by year. And before the Lord your God, in the place that he will choose, to make his name dwell there, you shall eat the tithe of your grain, of your wine, and of your oil, and the firstborn of your herd and flock, that you may learn to fear the Lord your God always" (Deut. 14:22–23). The Levites were supported by the tithe, 10 percent of all the yearly yield of that which was harvested.

Does that seem like a lot? Does it surprise you that St. Paul instructs us that we are to support the New Testament Gospel ministry "in the same way?" If it does, ask yourself: Is the church's job in the New Testament bigger or smaller than the Levites' job in the Old Testament? Back then, there was one Temple, and the ministry was almost exclusively located in one nation among the descendants of Abraham. In Matthew 28, Jesus calls us to teach and baptize all nations, and there are churches and ministries all around the world! How could we support this new Gospel ministry with anything less than the Israelites supported the Old Testament ministry?

Of course, we are free to give more, for we have received more than those in the Old Testament. We have received the fullness of God's revelation, the fullness of His salvation, and the fulfillment of everything that God promised to do. For we have received Christ, God's own Son, in the flesh, who took upon himself our sins and in exchange gave us his righteousness. The Father claimed us as his own in Holy Baptism. He gathers us together in the place where his name dwells to feast on the first fruits of the resurrection, the risen and living body and blood of His Son – our Lord Jesus. He reminds us that we are His, that all things are ours because we belong to Him. He blesses us here in time with physical and spiritual gifts.

In the same way – and in response to His fatherly divine goodness and mercy – we gladly give to those who proclaim to us "the excellencies of him who called us out of darkness and into his marvelous light." For once we were not a people, but now we are God's people; once we had not received mercy, but now we have indeed (1 Peter 2:9–10).


