God's Word of Forgiveness, Spoken to Us

When the resurrected Jesus appeared to the disciples on the evening of Easter day in a locked room where the disciples were hiding in fear, Jesus said to them, "Peace be with you." He showed them his hands and his side. His flesh had the marks of the crucifixion. Jesus had risen from the dead. The Lamb of God that had been sacrificed for our sin was alive, never to die again. Our sin had been dealt with. He was raised for our justification.

The peace Jesus spoke to that room is not to be downplayed. He was not referring to simply getting along with one another. Jesus was speaking the peace he had accomplished by dying for the sins of the world and reconciling the world to God. This was peace between God and man by Jesus' own blood. This was absolution—the reconciliation accomplished by Jesus applied to those men—the forgiveness of their sins.

Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, even so I am sending you." And when he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you withhold forgiveness from any, it is withheld." — John 20:21-23

This is the giving of the keys of the kingdom of heaven, of which Jesus had promised (Matt. 16:19). The church on earth has this gift from Christ—the pronouncement of the forgiveness of sins, which when exercised by called ministers of Christ, is just as valid and certain, even in heaven, as if Christ our dear Lord dealt with us Himself (Small Catechism).

The Lutheran reformers recognized this gift of Christ to the church as the priceless treasure that it is. Though errors of man had been introduced to the practice of private Confession by the time of the Reformation, it was the errors that needed removing, not the practice itself. Thus, in the Augsburg Confession, our fathers said, "Our churches teach that private Absolution should be retained in the churches..." (AC XI). Further, "Confession in the churches is not abolished among us. The body of the Lord is not usually given to those who have not been examined and absolved." (AC XXV). Why were the Lutherans so intent on preserving private Confession and Absolution? Not only because of its great help to the Christian as an "aid against sin and a consolation for a bad conscience," but also, and more importantly, because "it is ordained by Christ in the Gospel," as Luther wrote in the Smalcald Articles (SA III VIII). "Therefore, Confession and Absolution should by no means be abolished in the Church" (SA III VIII).

Standing on the promises of Christ, Confession and Absolution is not abolished among us. Private Confession and Absolution is offered and encouraged. Our freedom as Christians is being threatened with the loss of our tax-exempt status and other consequences. As Christians we will be challenged in our effort to uphold our true Christian beliefs. We could take the approach of the Pilgrims and seek a place where our Christian faith is not challenged (Where is that?). Rather this is our opportunity to witness to the world the truth of God's word and to uphold it, even if we also might suffer persecution.

The Pilgrims were aided by the Indians, but the Pilgrims could also share their faith with the Indians and thus help them to find their way to God's promised land. The Pilgrims also recognized the opportunity that was possible for their children. Not only did they have religious freedom, they also had the opportunity to provide their children the promise of better future. The early colonists provided for the education of their children not only in earthly skills but also for their eternal future. The first basic textbook in our new country was the New England Primer (McGuffy Reader). It was used not only to teach children to read, but also to teach Christian values. A few quotes from the reader, "In Adam's fall we sinned all." "Better is a little with the fear of the Lord, than great treasure and trouble therewith." "Come unto Christ all ye that labor and are heavy laden and He will give you rest." "Do not the abominable thing which I hate saith the Lord." Can you imagine that as the basic textbook in our typical American school?

Yet we rejoice that we live in a nation where there are many blessings and we can truly say, "O give thanks unto the Lord for He is good."

At St. Peter Lutheran School we are teaching the next Pilgrims in worldly skills and also to face the challenges of the new wilderness where Christian values are challenged and are disappearing. We also teach them to be thankful and to share the true joy that we have as His children.






