The Call

I find myself in strange ground once again as I have received a call. So, for the benefit of myself and others it is both good and profitable to review, what is and is not to be considered in a divine call. The first thing to be considered what the Call is and what it is not. Receiving a call is not a platform for extortion. It is not about me and what I can get out of it as someone who's in demand.

The pastoral office is not about being the top man, as is a President or CEO, CFO. The pastoral office is an office of humble service. What it is, is an opportunity to serve at the behest of the Good Shepard, Jesus Christ. As an under shepherd then I answer to the Good Shepherd as he leads, in his word, the Bible and as explained in the Book of Concord.

So the pastor is to lead, feed, and protect the sheep, not according to some cool ideas, but by the faithful adherence to God's instructions. Thus Peter and the other apostles, at a time when the church was growing beyond their ability to administrate as CEOs stated,

Acts 6:1–4 (ESV): Now in these days when the disciples were increasing in number, a complaint by the Hellenists arose against the Hebrews because their widows were being neglected in the daily distribution. 2 And the twelve summoned the full number of the disciples and said, "It is not right that we should give up preaching the word of God to serve tables. 3 Therefore, brothers, pick out from among you seven men of good repute, full of the Spirit and of wisdom, whom we will appoint to this duty. 4 But we will devote ourselves to prayer and to the ministry of the word."

The pastor then is to lead according to prayer and the ministry of the Word, not popular or contemporary philosophy, but by every word that comes from the mouth of the Lord. (Sure a pastor is still with and alongside the people, but not over above or to the neglect of the Word of God.) God has gifted His church with many other parts in the body to care for the earthly administration of worldly thing. The pastor guides and educates these people according God's instruction, not his own popular acceptance. A faithful pastor is all a congregation ever needs, because its people run the matters of the congregation according to the customs and norm unique to its own context. So the congregation is authentic to its context in outreach, stewardship, education and service native to its community. The congregation should not and cannot in any way rely on the pastor to build it and save it, because it only has one savior Jesus Christ. And the Christ in his wisdom has not given gifts to pastors only but,

Ephesians 4:10–12 (ESV): "He who descended is the one who also ascended far above all the heavens, that he might fill all things.) 11 And he gave the apostles, the prophets, the evangelists, the shepherds and teachers, 12 to equip the saints for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ".

So the pastor is to take individuals and form the individual parts into a body, fit to serve.

1 Peter 2:9–10 (ESV): But you are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people for his own possession, that you may proclaim the excellencies of him who called you out of darkness into his marvelous light. 10 Once you were not a people, but now you are God's people; once you had not received mercy, but now you have received mercy.

As important as a pastor is he is never to think more highly of himself as he should, for he is always to be a servant, yet always to uphold the dignity of the office as the representative of the Good Shepherd. This tightrope the pastor is to walk, apt to serve and wash the feet of the down trodden as well as exercise authority over the lofty as the ambassador of Christ, this he is to do by Christ's command. Thus the Call is an ominous one to be considered soberly with great prayer. For a great example of the Call is found in Acts.

Acts 16:6–10 (ESV): And they went through the region of Phrygia and Galatia, having been forbidden by the Holy Spirit to speak the word in Asia. ⁷ And when they had come up to Mysia, they attempted to go into Bithynia, but the Spirit of Jesus did not allow them. ⁸ So, passing by Mysia, they went down to Troas. ⁹ And a vision appeared to Paul in the night: a man of Macedonia was standing there, urging him and saying, "Come over to Macedonia and help us." ¹⁰ And when Paul had seen the vision, immediately we sought to go on into Macedonia, concluding that God had called us to preach the gospel to them.

So as it pertains to the Call, I do not yet know. So I shall pray, and I invite you all to pray, to inquire of Him what is His will, and to make it clear to all which way shall I serve.


