#### **Chasing the Elusive Mountaintop Experience**

Have you ever heard someone describe a church's worship service as a "mountain top experience?" Or how about with a word like "cold?" These descriptions imply that the usefulness of the church service is based on our emotional response. The subjectiveness of this metric is exposed by asking a person to explain *why* it was a mountaintop experience or *why* it was cold, a question for which a concrete answer is not easily found.

What do we know about our emotions? They, along with our entire beings, have been affected by sin. They are fickle and change quickly. Our emotions can even lie to us—we can feel something that in fact is not true. We cannot rely on how we feel in our hearts. The word of God places no confidence in the heart of man. *The heart is deceitful above all things* (Jeremiah 17:9). Therefore, our emotional response to a church service is a poor indicator of the benefits of that service and can in fact be misleading.

The tendency to look inward at our feelings to find God is nothing new—this tendency goes back to the fall itself, and we refer to it as *enthusiasm*. This word means "God within", and it is the tendency of our fallen nature which is obsessed with self.

Instead of inside ourselves, where we find wickedness and sin, God comes to us from outside of ourselves (*extra nos*). When we go to church, we have objective realities before us. We have the Word of God which endures forever. We have the abiding presence of Christ, who is the same yesterday, today, and forever. Regardless of how we feel, these things are true. Take one aspect of the service—confession and absolution. There may be days when you hear the words, "In the stead and by the command of my Lord Jesus Christ I forgive you all your sins," and yet you still feel unforgiven. What is to be relied upon, the fickle feelings of your depraved nature, or the very word and promise of God?

It is an enormous comfort that the value of the gifts given in Divine Service are not dependent on our emotional response. If they were, we would never have certainty in God's love for us. God's love for us is true when we have a mountaintop experience at church, and it is equally true when we still feel upset, sad, anxious, etc. when we leave. For we have certainty that God has blessed us in Jesus Christ, for his word is truth. This sustains us through the ups and downs, the range of emotions, and all the other things that fluctuate in our turbulent lives.

The Divine Service is not for eliciting a particular emotional response; rather, the service is focused on the certain gifts of a God that will not lie to us. We hear the word of Christ that our sins are forgiven, that we have a loving Father in heaven, and a hope that will not disappoint. We practice hearing this and clinging to Christ alone.

When tragedy strikes, if we've become accustomed to counting on the mountaintop to get us through, we are in trouble, for a mountaintop is sometimes nowhere to be found. When we find ourselves on our deathbeds, the certain promises of Christ will sustain as we pass through the gloomy portal of death and reach our promised inheritance. If we've relied on emotional highs instead of the Word of God to prove to ourselves that God loves us, the mountaintop will be hard to find in the valley of the shadow of death. But if we base our hope on the objective truth of God's word and His promises, we will not be shocked in the valley. We will wait patiently on the Lord, under his cross, believing his certain Word to us and receiving exactly what he has spoken.



#### A Year-Long Parade

This summer I had the opportunity to walk in the Mint Festival Parade representing our church and school. I walked alongside members of our congregation, parents, and students. If I could describe the parade in one word it would have to be "Excitement". Everyone walking was excited and full of energy. Everyone watching was excited, cheering, waving, and smiling. It was a celebration!

Shouldn't the beginning of the school year have that same feeling of excitement? The teachers are excited to meet their students, get to know them, celebrate their successes, and support them through their learning journey. They spend a lot of time decorating their rooms and planning those first lessons so that the students will join in that excitement as the school year begins. Excited to learn, collaborate, be curious, and have fun with their classmates.

At St. Peter the celebration is built on the joy that we have as Christians, knowing that Christ died for us, and in Him, we have eternal life. What a blessing it is to be able to celebrate this joy with our students this year. If you have the opportunity to talk to one of the students at St. Peter, I encourage you to ask them about the school, ask them what they are excited about. I pray that this will be an exciting year and that our students will truly have a reason to celebrate!

In this way, when someone leaves a portion of their assets to the Endowment Fund, these assets do not disappear over time but are left invested so the fund can continue to grow and the interest is available for distribution.

Many churches, as well as our own Michigan District, have established endowment funds to financially support a variety of specific projects.

Our Endowment Fund at St Peter Lutheran Church is held by In Faith Community Foundation. In Faith, in conjunction with Thrivent, has always worked to innovate and be flexible on behalf of those they serve. They are set up to help each congregation's Endowment Fund succeed and create a strong foundation for generations to come.





#### Newsletter article - September 2021

At the end of the first of his chapters on the virtue of faith in *Mere Christianity*, C.S. Lewis provides a helpful reminder, by way of analogy, for the foundation of stewardship. He wrote:

"Every faculty you have, your power of thinking or of moving your limbs from moment to moment, is given you by God. If you devoted every moment of your whole life exclusively to His service you could not give Him anything that was not in a sense His own already. So then, when we talk of a man doing anything for God or giving anything to God, I will tell you what it is really like. It is like a small child going to its father and saying, 'Daddy, give me sixpence to buy you a birthday present.' Of course, the father does, and he is pleased with the child's present. It is all very nice and proper, but only an idiot would think that the father is sixpence to the good on the transaction. When a man has made these two discoveries God can really get to work. It is after this that real life begins. (128–129)."

This is the first thing we are given to confess about stewardship, and it has to do with ownership. God owns everything, and we are simply managers – stewards – acting on His behalf. This is true not only of all that we have in this life (Deut. 8:17–18) but also all that we are in this life (1 Cor. 6:20).

The rest flows from here. Since we are stewards, or managers, of what belongs to God, entrusted to make use of it according to His will, there is an expectation of responsibility and accountability. For the Lord said, "Everyone to whom much was given, of him much will be required, and from him to whom they entrusted much, they will demand the more" (Luke 12:48b). And from this comes blessing and reward: "Well done, good and faithful servant. You have been faithful over a little; I will set you over much. Enter into the joy of your master" (Matt. 25:21).

We have everything we need to support this body and life from our God's fatherly divine goodness and mercy, without any merit or worthiness in us. We have everything we need for our spiritual life also from His merciful hands. Because of the sacrifice of His Son, our Lord Jesus, through the preaching of the gospel and the administration of the sacraments, we have the forgiveness of sins, eternal life, and everlasting salvation delivered to us with absolute certainty that it is ours – not as stewards but as sons (Gal. 4:1–7). Let us then, as His own sons, press all that He gives to us into the service of His church and to His glory.
