A LETTER FROM THE PASTOR

Augsburg Confession: Article V – The Ministry

AC V

That we may obtain this faith, the Ministry of Teaching the Gospel and administering the Sacraments was instituted. For through the Word and Sacraments, as through instruments, the Holy Ghost is given, who works faith; where and when it pleases God, in them that hear the Gospel, to wit, that God, not for our own merits, but for Christ's sake, justifies those who believe that they are received into grace for Christ's sake.

They condemn the Anabaptists and other who think that the Holy Ghost comes to men without the external Word, through their own preparations and works.

Article IV of the Augsburg Confession was the article on Justification, the fact that we are counted righteous before God through faith in Christ, believing that for His sake, our sins are forgiven, and God is favorably disposed toward us. This is the heart and center of our faith.

Article V then goes on to say how this faith is obtained. It does not drop into our hearts from thin air, and it certainly does not come from within. This faith is obtained by the power of the Holy Spirit. And the Holy Spirit deals with men through outward means—namely, through the Word and Sacraments. Therefore, God instituted the Ministry of teaching the Gospel and administering the Sacraments, for through these means the Holy Spirit brings sinners to saving faith.

So, the article deals primarily with the means of grace, the external Word through which the Holy Spirit comes to man. But the article also clearly defines the Office of the Ministry (referred to in the German version of the Augsburg Confession as the "Preaching Office"). Christ instituted an office for the purpose of preaching the Gospel and administering the Sacraments. We commonly refer to those placed into this office as "pastor." The means of grace are not to be handled as the church sees fit, but through the office established by God.

Condemned in this article are those who think that the Holy Ghost comes to men without the external Word. Today, this condemned belief is commonly held within the Pentecostal and Charismatic movements of Christianity. In the Smalcald Articles, Luther had this to say about the Holy Spirit's use of means: "Therefore we ought and must constantly maintain this point, that God does not wish to deal with us otherwise than through the spoken Word and the Sacraments. It is the devil himself whatsoever is extolled as Spirit without the Word and Sacraments" (SA III VIII).

Where these truths about God's means of grace are believed, church attendance is not lacking.

The LORD is my shepherd; I shall not want. He makes me lie down in green pastures. He leads me beside still waters. He resources my soul. He leads me in paths of righteousness for his name's sake. Even though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil, for you are with me; your rod and your staff, they comfort me. You prepare a table before me in the presence of my enemies; you anoint my head with oil; my cup overflows. Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life, and I shall dwell in the house of the LORD forever. — Psalm 23:1-6

The valley of the shadow of death paints such a dark picture. It can be easy to focus on that and not the rest of it. Isn't that a part of our sinful human nature, to focus on the bad all around us and forget about the blessings poured out on us daily?

As I read the rest of the verses, I can't help but think about the Lord's Prayer and the 1st Article of the Apostles Creed that the students are learning just this week at school. God is telling us that He will always provide for us all that we need. He will be there next to us to guide and protect us. He will never leave us. God is beside us each day as we encounter struggles and obstacles in our lives.

As you pray for the school and the church, pray that the students find comfort in Christ and not worry in their lives each day. Pray that families feel peace knowing God didn't throw us into this sinful world and walk away, but is with us always, showing us mercy and blessing our lives. Pray for our church, that as a congregation, we too focus on the many blessings and not the struggles we face. God tells us right in these verses that He is with us. He did not create us and then leave us. He not only stayed with us but sent His son Jesus to die in our place.

A LETTER FROM OUR CANTOR

Why We Do What We Do

What does the Divine Service on Sunday have to do with Christian Stewardship? Part II

Last time we walked through Sunday morning up through the Scripture Lessons, looking at how the liturgy speaks to the issue of Christian Stewardship. But that was just the beginning. Literally!

Don't even get me started on the Hymn of the Day! The hymnal has a complete section on stewardship (LSB 781-789), including the one presented in the bulletin recently, "We Give Thee But Thine Own." But the ones that speak about God's gifts to us and our response to him in our worship and life would fill the rest of this page!

Luther wrote, "I believe that God has made me and all creatures, that he has given me my body and soul, eyes, ears, and all my members, my reason and all my senses, and still preserves them... that he richly and daily provides me with all that I need to support this body and life... for all which is it my duty to thank and praise, to serve and obey him. This is most certainly true" (Small Catechism, Art. I). If we remember that the Creed is a response to what we have received, then it fits perfectly in this topic. Here we make a public profession of everything God has done and continues daily to do as Creator, Redeemer and Sanctifier. All we are and have and hope to be are his gifts!

Sometimes it's easy to think we're giving our Offering to keep the lights on and the bills paid. How tragically shortsighted! When you were a child and someone gave you a gift, what did your parents teach you; "Say 'Thank you." Sometimes they had you write out a thank you card. What do you say to the Person who has given you EVERYTHING? How do you place a value on that? Perhaps we forget that our offerings enable our school to reach out to children and families to learn of Jesus for the first time. We support mission work in this country and around the world; as stewards of the Good News of Jesus Christ, what could be a higher honor?

The Offertories we sing with the Offering are interesting. The traditional one we know (LSB p.192) is taken from Psalm 51. In these verses, we ask God for things like a clean heart, a right spirit, and to "renew in me the JOY of your salvation" (emphasis added). In the newer one (LSB p. 159 & 176), from Psalm 116, we ask, "What shall I render to the Lord for all his benefits to me?" Good question! A fascinating answer is worship, "I will offer the sacrifice of thanksgiving and will call on the name of the Lord." The psalmist provides an example for us; as a member of the congregation, he pledges his offering to God, and then fulfills that pledge.

In the Preface, our stewardship theme continues as we prepare to receive the Sacrament of the Altar. Again, what is the first thing you do when you receive a gift? Say, "Thank you." "Lift up your hearts." "We lift them to the Lord." "Let us give thanks to the Lord our God." "It is right to give Him thanks and praise." "It is good, right and salutary that we give you thanks...." Salutary – that's an odd word. It simply means "healthy"; it's HEALTHY for us to give God thanks and praise.

We conclude the Sacrament by either singing "Lord, now you let your servant go in peace" because he's kept his promise to us (Nunc Dimittis), or "Thank the Lord and sing His praise, tell everyone what he has done...", based on Psalm 105. An essential part of giving thanks is telling others what we have right to give Him thanks and praise." "It is good, right and salutary that we give you thanks...." Salutary – that's an odd word. It simply means "healthy"; it's HEALTHY for us to give God thanks and praise.

CANTOR/SCHOOL NEWS

After the Sacrament, the high point in the service, the Liturgy wraps up quickly. The Benedicamus and Post Communion Collect continue the theme of giving thanks for what our God has so graciously given us.

Yet he has one more gift for us as we receive his Benediction, knowing he looks upon us with favor because of Jesus Christ.

Some parishes dismiss the congregation with the admonition, "Go in peace. Serve the Lord." Martin Luther has some interesting thoughts about that:

I know that everything I do in the name of Christ must please God, even though it vexes the devil. Therefore I will go my way and perform all the tasks I can and must in my calling, no matter how lowly this calling may be. I know that God places his stamp of approval on them and that they please Him just as much as do the most beautiful, most arduous, and most precious works performed in the highest vocation. (Luther's Works 24:240)

This is the life of a Christian Steward.

I hope to share more of why we do what we do. Perhaps if you have a particular question or concern, you might pass that along to me through the church office.
