Augsburg Confession: Article IV – Justification

Also they teach that men cannot be justified before God by their own strength, merits, or works, but are freely justified for Christ's sake, through faith, when they believe that they are received into favor, and that their sins are forgiven for Christ's sake, who, by His death has made satisfaction for our sins. This faith God imputes for righteousness in His sight. (Romans 3 and 4). (AC IV)

It is said within Lutheranism that this is the article on which the Church stands or falls. In the Smalcald Articles, Luther, speaking about justification says, "Nothing of this article can be yielded or surrendered, even though heaven and earth and everything else falls."

This article is the heart of the Gospel—that we are saved by God's grace alone, through faith alone, in Christ alone. This means that we are saved apart from our works, as Scripture teaches. To be justified means that God declares us righteous for the sake of Jesus Christ. Jesus bore our sins in his body and died on the tree and rose again from the dead for this very purpose—for our justification. Our salvation is entirely God's work, not ours. He accomplished our salvation in Jesus Christ, who lived a sinless life and made satisfaction for our sins by His death. When we believe that God has done this for us, and that for Christ's sake our sins are forgiven, God counts this faith for righteousness in his sight. Faith alone justifies us before God.

Any "gospel" that teaches otherwise is no gospel at all. Any "gospel" that places man's efforts, strength, merits, or works into the equation is false. This error deprives poor sinners of the assurance of their salvation and the confidence they ought to have in Christ, and instead leaves them asking the terrible question—have I done enough?

Our works never can make satisfaction for our sins—only Christ's work makes satisfaction for our sins. Jesus says, "Come to me, all who are weary and heavy laden, and I will give you rest." Christ has atoned for our sins and eternal life is the free gift of God. We can rest from our labors, rest from our worry of if we've done enough. We can confess freely to be a poor, miserable, sinner, and joyfully know that Christ has done enough. In Christ, and by his work alone, we are forgiven before God.

A LETTER FROM OUR CANTOR

Why We Do What We Do

What does the Divine Service on Sunday have to do with Christian Stewardship? Lots!!! Let's walk through some examples.

Right at the beginning we confess that we are poor stewards who have failed the vocations God has given us "in thought, word and deed, by what we have done and by what we have left undone. We have not loved (Him) with our whole heart; we have not loved our neighbors as ourselves." We've been all too focused on ourselves and our "stuff." As Pastor pronounces Absolution, we are called back to our Baptism and our life in the God who created, preserves, redeemed and sanctifies us.

A few weeks ago, the Introit had this very discordant, disconcerting passage: "The Mighty One, God the LORD, speaks and summons the earth from the rising of the sun to its setting.... I will not accept a bull from your house or goats from your folds. For every beast of the forest is mine, the cattle on a thousand hills" (Ps. 50:1, 9-10). Sometimes we feel we're doing God a favor by coming to church and giving our offering. He calls us up short by rejecting the attitude and rejecting the gift. He reminds us all creation, including us, is his and in his overwhelming mercy he invites us to come into his presence and enjoy the gifts HE has to give US.

The Prayer, or Collect, of the Day ties in to the season of the Church year and the readings for the day. But notice how many times it expresses something like this one: "Almighty God, our heavenly Father, your mercies are new every morning and though we deserve only punishment, you receive us as your children and provide for all our needs of body and soul (What an AMAZING realization). Grant that we may heartily acknowledge your merciful goodness, give thanks for all your benefits, and serve you in willing obedience...." Isn't this the whole point of the Christian life?

The Old Testament Lessons on Sunday are overflowing with messages about stewardship. Consider what God, speaking through the prophet Nathan, said to David, "I anointed you king of Israel and it is I who delivered you from the hand of Saul... and if that had been too little, I would have added to you many more things like these!... You struck down Uriah the Hittite with the sword and took his wife to be your wife" (II Samuel 12:7, 9, emphasis added). Notice the difference between God giving and David taking. Other examples are endless.

The Epistle Lessons are often from the Letters of Paul, who wrote things like, "I appeal to you, fellow Christians, by the mercies of God, to give your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and pleasing to God, and so worship him as thinking beings. Don't live like this world..." (Rom. 12:1-2) He wrote about how we Christians are individually parts of a single body (I Cor. 12:13), so that when one of us hurts, we all hurt. He described how the church in Macedonia, though very poor, contributed generously to the church in Jerusalem undergoing a famine, and added, "And they did not do as we expected, but they gave themselves first to the Lord and then to us in keeping with God's will" (II Cor. 8:1-5). Peter joins the stewardship theme: "Each one should use whatever gift he has received to serve others, faithfully administering God's grace in its various forms" (I Pet. 4:10).

Listen closely during the Gospel Lesson. Someone has made the observation that, counting the number of verses, Jesus spent more time talking about money and possessions than he did about anything else, including heaven and hell. How we manage the gifts God gives us reflects our faith in and worship of him (Matt. 6:21). This just begins our exploration of this subject. Next time I'll share some more insights in how our worship on Sunday morning relates to the issue of Stewardship.

I hope to share more of why we do what we do. Perhaps if you have a particular question or concern, you might pass that along to me through the church office.

It's in the Way that You Use It

Consider the humble baseball bat. It is a simple tool designed for a complex task. The batter needs a tool that can consistently deliver force to a small ball which may be thrown at over 100 miles per hour, but which might also come slanting across the plate as a slow curve. For a game like this, the founders of baseball had to redesign the old cricket bat, which is more of a flat paddle. The tool had to fit the job.

But even a specially-designed tool can be used for a different purpose. It turns out that some years ago in England, the home of cricket, baseball bats suddenly started selling like hotcakes. What were folks across the pond doing with all those baseball bats? Using them as clubs in riots!

A tool can be used, and it can be misused. It's all in the way that you use it.

The same is true with the things of God. The Second Commandment states that we should "not misuse the name of the Lord." In the Small Catechism, Luther goes on to tell us exactly what this misuse is, as well as the proper use:

"We should fear and love God so that we do not curse, swear, use satanic arts, lie, or deceive by His name, but call upon it in every trouble, pray, praise, and give thanks." (SC I)

The Lord has given us His name: He has placed it upon us in Holy Baptism and He has invited us to pray to Him as our Father. In this sense, the Lord's name is something for us to use. We should not misuse it ... and we should not fail to use it. The Pharisees of old were so afraid of misusing the name of God that they decided to simply never say the name of God (YHWH, Jehovah) at all! This non-use is just as bad as misuse. The Lord gives His gifts for our use.

A Christian steward is one who is called to use all of God's gifts for His purposes. This includes things like the Name of God, the Sacraments and the Word, and it also includes things like our family and friends, our talents and skills, our money and resources. Everything that God has given to you, He has given to you so that you may be blessed to use it for His kingdom.

It's all in the way that you use it!
