A LETTER FROM THE PASTOR

Augsburg Confession: Article VIII - What the Church Is

Although the Church properly is the congregation of saints and true believers, nevertheless, since in this life many hypocrites and evil persons are mingled therewith, it is lawful to use Sacraments administered by evil men, according to the saying of Christ: The Scribes and the Pharisees sit in Moses' seat, etc. Matt. 23, 2. Both the Sacraments and Word are effectual by reason of the institution and commandment of Christ, notwithstanding they be administered by evil men.

They condemn the Donatists, and such like, who denied it to be lawful to use the ministry of evil men in the Church, and who thought the ministry of evil men to be unprofitable and of none effect.

The Church is made up only of those with Spirit-wrought faith in Jesus Christ, who know God to be gracious to them for Christ's sake. However, hearts cannot be seen by men, but only by God. Though we can recognize good and bad fruit, the fact remains that the Church in this life is hidden. God knows. At the end of the age, the sons of God will be revealed (Romans 8:19). Until then, your life is hidden with Christ in God (Colossians 3:3). And yet, we can say with certainty where the Church exists—it is in the gathering of people around the means of God's grace—the Word and Sacraments. Through these means, the Spirit builds and preserves a people of God. Where these means are present, the Church is.

In this life, there are in this assembly hypocrites as well—those without faith in Christ—who pose as believers. Sometimes their bad fruit exposes them, and sometimes they blend in. This will be sorted out in the end.

Because the Church on earth is hidden and hearts cannot be seen by men, both hearers of the Word and preachers can be hypocrites. This raises the question of what one is to think if it turns out that their pastor is a hypocrite, an evil person posing as a believer. The ministry of the Word and Sacrament is efficacious not on account of the person in the Office, but on account of the Word of God, the very institution and command of Christ. So long as the Word is being faithfully preached and the sacraments rightly administered, even if the person doing it is faithless, the gifts of God are present for His people. His gifts are not dependent on the holiness of the minister.

This is a great comfort. For if this were not true, we would be deprived of the certainty of our baptisms, the presence of Christ's body and blood for us in the Eucharist, and the power of the Gospel in our midst.

Condemned are the Donatists. These are folks who witnessed Christians caving under Roman persecution and renouncing Christ, some of whom had been priests. The Donatists concluded that for the priests who defected, their ministries had been useless. But this is not true—the people under their care heard the voice of Jesus and received his gifts of forgiveness, life, and salvation. Notwithstanding the man in the Office, the ministry is effective for us because it is Christ's ministry. When the Word and Sacraments are present, we have the certain promises of God.

A LETTER FROM OUR CANTOR

Why We Do What We Do

"I as a called and ordained servant of the Word...."

The recent voters' meeting compels me to return to an earlier topic. In debating the proposed Constitution and Bylaws, it was pointed out several times that the current Bylaws mandate for the Board of Elders states:

The basic objectives of this Board are the spiritual welfare of the Pastor and congregation members, individually and corporately, and the supervision of the Pastor, supporting him in everything pertaining to congregational worship. (Bylaws, Art. VI, D).

As elder, as well as unofficial cantor, I can assure you I am in no way Pastor's "supervisor"! He is theologically trained and qualified by our Synod to serve in the Office of the Ministry. He is the "called and ordained servant of the Word." I am a layman. Some of you may know that I am seminary trained with a Masters of Divinity and a Masters of Sacred Theology from Concordia, St. Louis. Nevertheless, I am still a layman. Pastor and I can and do have serious and in-depth theological discussions, as do the other members of the Board of Elders. Yet Pastor is the one called by God to serve in this congregation as its shepherd. If you want to look for his "supervisor", that would be the District President of the Michigan District of the LC-MS.

The only point at which the Board of Elders, or any member of this congregation, have the right to interfere in his ministry would be if he demonstrated:

- 1. Persistent adherence to false doctrine;
- 2. Scandalous life;
- 3. Willful neglect of official duties;
- 4. Evident and protracted incapacity to perform the functions and duties of the office to which that person has been called. (Bylaws, Art. VII, F. {not, by the way, Art V as stated in the current Constitution})

Even then, the congregation would have to work in collaboration with the District President.

That leads me to this item listed in the duties of the Board of Elders:

"Approve and disapprove new forms of worship, liturgies, hymns for use in public worship" (Bylaws, Art. VI, D, 27). That is totally out of line! I as a layman have no authority or expertise to determine what is theologically sound and appropriate for our worship. Who am I to decide what liturgies or hymns to use? If Pastor chose to do something he picked up from a Baptist service or introduce a song by Amy Grant, what elder would have the insight to know that's not a good idea for Lutheran worship? In the Bylaws which were voted down, this item was revised to say, "Ensure the use of synodically-approved worship resources." That is a reasonable duty and expectation of the Board of Elders. As a member of the Lutheran Church – Missouri Synod, our congregation committed itself to such worship practice. And our Synod has adopted for use the Lutheran Service Book (Concordia Publishing House, 2006).

If you're expecting a congregation that supervises the pastor, you need to look to the Baptists or the Presbyterians or the Congregationalists or the local Bible churches, who have the authority to hire and fire the pastor as they please, who tell him exactly how they want the church to be run. That is not Lutheran theology of the Office of the Holy Ministry. The proposed Constitution and Bylaws were considered unacceptable, and that's fine. But it must be understood that there are serious flaws in the current Constitution and Bylaws, especially as it views the relationship between the pastor and the congregation, and these need to be corrected.

I hope to share more of why we do what we do. Perhaps if you have a particular question or concern, you might pass that along to me through the church office.

Caring for My Neighbor

If any of the Ten Commandments might tempt us to think that keeping the Law is easy, it would be the Fifth Commandment. After all, how hard is it to get through life without murdering somebody? The vast majority of people can handle that!

But Jesus famously blows up this notion by pointing out that the command, "you shall not murder," goes much deeper — down to the heart.

You have heard that it was said to those of old, "You shall not murder; and whoever murders will be liable to judgment." But I say to you that everyone who is angry with his brother will be liable to judgment; whoever insults his brother will be liable to the council; and whoever says, "You fool!" will be liable to the hell of fire. (Matt. 5:21–22)

Hatred and disdain come from the same sort of crookedness of heart as murder. With both murder and hatred, you look down on another person and think them of little worth.

In the Small Catechism, Luther also points out that every "do not" in the commandments also includes a "do this:" "We should fear and love God so that we do not hurt or harm our neighbor in his body but help and support him in every physical need" (SC, Fifth Commandment, emphasis added).

We are not called merely to avoid evil; we must also do positive good.

So when Jesus drew near to us and became our neighbor by taking up our humanity, He came not only to avoid harming us, but He came to positively help us, bless us and serve us.

We are now called to show the love to our neighbors that Christ showed to us. Your neighbor is yet another gift that God has given you that requires your stewardship. We are called to show mercy, to be kind, to love and serve our neighbor. One aspect of this stewardship is financial: our neighbors need us to support the church's work so that they can hear the Gospel and come to faith. Our neighbors need the church's alms and mercy work. Our neighbors need our faithful service in all we do in the name of Christ.
