A LETTER FROM THE PASTOR

Augsburg Confession Article XXIV: Of the Mass (Continued)

.... 28] Scripture also teaches that we are justified before God through faith in Christ, when we believe that our sins are forgiven for Christ's sake. 29] Now if the Mass take away the sins of the living and the dead by the outward act justification comes of the work of Masses, and not of faith, which Scripture does not allow.

30] But Christ commands us, Luke 22, 19: This do in remembrance of Me; therefore the Mass was instituted that the faith of those who use the Sacrament should remember what benefits it receives through Christ, and cheer and comfort the anxious conscience. For to remember Christ is to remember His benefits, 31] and to realize that they are truly offered unto us. 32]Nor is it enough only to remember the history; for this also the Jews and the ungodly can remember. 33] Wherefore the Mass is to be used to this end, that there the Sacrament [Communion] may be administered to them that have need of consolation; as Ambrose says: Because I always sin, I am always bound to take the medicine. [Therefore this Sacrament requires faith, and is used in vain without faith.]

34] Now, forasmuch as the Mass is such a giving of the Sacrament, we hold one communion every holy-day, and if any desire the Sacrament, also on other days, when it is given to such as ask for it. 35] And this custom is not new in the Church; for the Fathers before Gregory make no mention of any private Mass, but of the common Mass [the Communion] they speak very much. Chrysostom says 36] that the priest stands daily at the altar, inviting some 37] to the Communion and keeping back others. And it appears from the ancient Canons that some one celebrated the Mass from whom all the other presbyters and deacons received the body of the Lord; for thus 38] the words of the Nicene Canon say: Let the deacons, according to their order, receive the Holy Communion after the presbyters, from the bishop or from a presbyter. 39] And Paul 1 Cor. 11, 33, commands concerning the Communion: Tarry one for another, so that there may be a common participation.

40] Forasmuch, therefore, as the Mass with us has the example of the Church, taken from the Scripture and the Fathers, we are confident that it cannot be disapproved, especially since public ceremonies, for the most part like those hither to in use, are retained; only the number of Masses differs, which because of very great and manifest abuses doubtless might be profitably reduced. 41] For in olden times, even in churches most frequented, the Mass was not celebrated every day, as the Tripartite History (Book 9, chap. 33) testifies: Again in Alexandria, every Wednesday and Friday the Scriptures are read, and the doctors expound them, and all things are done, except the solemn rite of Communion.

This month finally brings us to an end of Article XXIV. The length of the article is a testament to the importance of this issue—the proper use of the Mass as God's service to us, graciously giving the benefits of Christ to be received through faith. This pertains to the chief article of justification, "that we are justified before God through faith in Christ, when we believe that our sins are forgiven for Christ's sake." So what matters in the Mass is not our work, but the benefits of Christ's work, offered and received in faith.

We assert here that Holy Communion is held "every holy-day," which as we see in the Apology, means "every Lord's Day and on the other festivals" (Ap XXIV.1). Weekly communion (and plus some!) is the practice of churches of the Augsburg Confession. This was an overall decrease in the number of Masses, since in our churches, private Mass was abolished, and the common Mass, according to the Lord's institution, was retained.

We also make mention of Chrysostom's words that speak of the common Mass, and in addition to showing the communal nature of the mass his day, his words also show us the antiquity of the practice of closed communion – "the priest stands daily at the altar, inviting some to the Communion and keeping back others." John Chrysostom lived c. 347-407. So we continue faithfully administering the Holy Communion in our churches—inviting some, and keeping back others whose impenitence or lack of understanding prevents them from participation. This, of course, is not only faithful practice, but also for the good of those coming—that they might not receive the body and blood of Jesus to their condemnation (1 Cor. 11:29).

Finally, this article ends where it began—that not only do we uphold the Mass in our churches, but that the "public ceremonies, for the most part like those hither to in use, are retained." If you're looking for a church that does not resemble the church catholic in its ceremony, you are not looking for a Lutheran church.

A LETTER FROM THE CANTOR

Who We Are

You may have never heard of Melanchthon, Cranach, Chemnitz or Gerhardt before. But I'm pretty confident you've heard of this next important Lutheran, Johann Sebastian Bach. Bach was born in 1684, 140 years after Luther's death, in the city of Eisenach to a musical family. Orphaned at age 10, he lived for several years with his oldest brother. After completing his musical education, he served as musician for churches in Arnstadt and Mühlhausen and as court musician in Weimar.

In 1707 he married Maria Barbara Bach, his second cousin. They had seven children, three of whom died before their first birthday. But of the surviving children, two went on to become famous on their own, Wilhelm Friedemann Bach and Carl Philipp Emanuel Bach. Maria died suddenly in July 1720. Johann met Anna Magdalena Wilcke, sixteen years younger than Bach; they married in December 1721. Johann and Anna Magdalena had thirteen children, six of whom survived to adulthood. Among these, Johann Christoph Friedrich Bach and Johann Christian Bach also became famous musicians and composers.

In 1708 he became organist at Weimar. In 1714, he was appointed Konzertmeister, which required him to compose a church cantata each month at the castle church, beginning on Palm Sunday that year. However, relations between him and his employer did not go well, and he was fired in November, 1717. Prince Leopold of Anhalt-Köthen hired him as music director for the next six years. But Leopold was a Calvinist and didn't require elaborate church music, so most of Bach's compositions at this time were secular.

In 1723 Bach was hired as Kantor, or director of church music, for St. Thomas Church, Leipzig. He would serve here until his death in 1750. During that time, he supplied music not only for St. Thomas Church, but also three other Lutheran churches in Leipzig. In addition to teaching music and singing to the students at St. Thomas School, he was required to write a cantata for every Sunday and each major feast day during the year. In all he composed over 300 cantatas, of which 100 have been lost. Many of the cantatas were based on the Gospel text for the day. Others were based on hymns, such as "Wake, Awake for Night is Flying" (LSB 516), and "O Morning Star, How Fair and Bright" (LSB 395). Often he incorporated one of the chorales composed by Martin Luther.

Perhaps most significant for us are his major works. For example, his Christmas Oratorio was a set of six cantatas, one each to be performed on three days of Christmas, on New Years, the Sunday after New Year, and Epiphany. Also important are his St. Matthew Passion, St. John Passion, and St. Mark Passion (lost). For the Passions, he set the account from the Gospel to music, interspersed with chorales, similar to Handel's "Messiah."

In 1750 Bach's eyesight was failing. He underwent eye surgery twice from a man now generally consider to have been a quack. On July 28, 1750, he died of complications from the surgery. He was originally buried at St. John's Church in Leipzig. But the building was destroyed by Allied bombing in World War II. In 1950 his remains were moved to the floor of the choir, before the altar, in St. Thomas Church. It may seem odd now, but Bach slipped into relative obscurity. Felix Mendelssohn, then also the Kantor of St. Thomas Church, gave a performance of Bach's St. Matthew Passion in 1829, which started a revival of interest in Bach and his music which has persisted to this day.

Why should we care about Johann Sebastian Bach? First of all, because he is perhaps the greatest composer of the Baroque era. Any person with an interest in classical music knows and recognizes his Brandenburg Concerti. But his most important contribution to music was that written as a profession of his faith as a Lutheran Christian. His music continues to enhance our worship (LSB 378, 414, 449, 546, 657, 898). If you turn to the Commemorations at the front of the hymnal, p. xii-xiii, you'll notice we remember Johann Sebastian Bach on July 28, the day of his death.

I'll share more about the people who have shaped our church over time and made us who we are.
